The following was elected: President: Rev Paddy Moore, Chairperson: Mary Lawler, Vice-chairperson: Angela Rafferty, Secretary: Ann Rafferty, Ass secretary: Ann Lawler, Treasurer: Marie Clynch. Team captain Mary foley, vice captain Una Dowling. Delegates to the county board Ann Rafferty and Mary Lawler. Team selectors Nat Pearson, Mary Foley and John Timmins. The club would never have been formed only for the leadership of Hugh Rafferty and his wife Nancy, sisters Mary and Ann Lawler, Feddan, Nat Pearson and the Rafferty sisters Angela and Ann. The team had played a number of friendly matches with no suitable uniform, they relied on the

The team had played a number of friendly matches with no suitable uniform, they relied on the jerseys from the GAA team if they were not playing, they also played in football shorts. They elected on red and white but this was ruled out by the County Board as Aughrim had all ready chosen these colours. after much discussion the club settled on maroon and white. Angela Rafferty and Eilish Doody were given something in the region of £40 and dispatched to Dublin with instructions to do their best as money was scarce. Mission accomplished they returned with the goods, a maroon pinafore cross over buttons down the front. Cost £2 each. Each member had to provide their own white blouse. Mrs Nancy Rafferty crocheted a white sash to match each uniform and this completed with black tights was enough to instil fear in any opposition. More to follow next week.

#### SUNDAY MARCH 19th is MOTHERS DAY

Celebrations of mothers and motherhood can be traced back to the ancient Greeks and Romans, who held festivals in honour of the mother goddesses Rhea and Cybele, but the clearest modern precedent for Mother's Day is the early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday." Did vou know? More phone calls are made on Mother's Day than any other day of the year. These holiday chats with Mom often cause phone traffic to spike by as much as 37 percent. While versions of Mother's Day are celebrated worldwide, traditions vary depending on the country. In Thailand, for example, Mother's Day is always celebrated in August on the birthday of the current queen. Sirikit.

Another alternate observance of Mother's Day can be found in Ethiopia, where families gather each fall to sing songs and eat a large feast as part of Antrosht, a multi-day celebration honouring motherhood.

In the United States, Mother's Day continues to be celebrated by presenting mothers and other women with gifts and flowers, and it has become one of the biggest holidays for consumer spending. Families also celebrate by giving mothers a day off from activities like cooking or other household chores.
