John 20:19-23

Peace be with you

We read today that the disciples are locked away in a house. Fear has gripped them. Their friend has been killed, their hopes and dreams have been shattered and now they fear for their own lives. This scene takes place after Mary Magdalene has already told them that she has seen the risen Jesus, but they don't believe her. The disciples remain closed.

There are times in our lives when we too isolate ourselves, and other times when we have no choice but to do so. One only must recall the COVID-19 pandemic that began in 2020. At the beginning of that year, no one could imagine the way the pandemic would unfold across the world: the rapid spread of infection, the staggering death toll, overburdened hospitals, the world in lockdown, businesses closed. In the first weeks of social distancing many people were in shock, and this shock would soon turn to anxiety and fear. Many vulnerable people were left alone and afraid. We experienced a collective grief as this new reality unfolded.

Today's Gospel reminds us that dark situations can be transformed. During the pandemic, we witnessed many extraordinary acts of kindness and generosity. Think of the heroes on the frontline who put their lives at risk for those suffering, or the good neighbours and friends who reach out to one another. These rays of light help us to remember that the Spirit is constantly at work in this world, transforming situations, moving us to act in spaces that seem hopeless. Any period of isolation can be tough, but it can also be an opportunity to take stock, to think about what kind of world we want to live in, and how we can contribute to the emergence of that world. One does not emerge from a crisis unchanged. The Risen Christ *breathes* the Spirit into our lives continuously, offering us peace – Shalom – and the opportunity for renewal.

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“Historically, pandemics have forced humans to break with the past and imagine their world anew. This one is no different. It is a portal, a gateway between one world and the next. We can choose to walk through it, dragging the carcasses of . . . our dead ideas, our dead rivers and smoky skies behind us. Or we can walk through lightly, with little luggage, ready to imagine another world – Arundhati Roy.

A LIGHT UNTO MY PATH - PENTECOST SUNDAY

After the crucifixion of Jesus, the Lord's disciples must have been terrified. The master, to whom they had dedicated their lives, had been brutally put to death on a Roman instrument of torture. Because Jesus was seen as a threat to both the Roman and Jewish establishment, he had been beaten, scourged, nailed to the cross, and left to die. The mocking sign over his head – *Jesus the Nazorean, the King of the Jews* – was meant both to humiliate the crucified and to warn anyone who cared to know this man had been an enemy of the state. So his followers must have come to the obvious conclusion that they too were wanted men, facing the clear and present danger of themselves arrested, tried and crucified. And this is precisely why the Gospel tells us that the doors were locked in the place where the disciples cowered.

But despite the locked doors, we are told, *Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you'.* It is always frightening to follow Jesus, for his is a path that leads inevitably to the cross. To be a disciple of Jesus is to commit oneself to love – and love always costs. But the incomparably good news is that Jesus himself has faced this fear down and conquered it, demonstrating through his Resurrection that God's love is stronger than anything that is in the world. No cruelty; no hatred, no violence, no threat, no political power, no earthly army can ever overwhelm the divine love. And therefore, we followers of the Lord, even as we face the cross, can find peace. Nowhere in the New Testament do we find a guarantee that Christians will never be afraid; but on practically every page of the New Testament, we find the promise that the peace offered by the risen Lord is stronger than any fear. *Magnificat, June 2022.*
