

LOOKING BACK 50 YEARS TO 1974

1974 was a year to remember or forget for our club as we drew a blank on the playing field when we reached five finals two in hurling three in football under the guidance of our trainer Martin Doogue. In both codes our Junior football team were beaten by Blessington in the West Final Tutty Cup by one point 0-09 to 0-08 and Blessington went on to win their first Junior Football Championship that year. We were beaten in the final of the Corcoran Cup by the same opposition and the Leader Cup by Donard by a one point margin. In hurling we were now Intermediate after winning the Junior Hurling Championship in '73 and we were beaten in the county final by five points by Avoca. Final score Kiltegan 0-11 Avoca 3-07. We were beaten in the Intermediate League final by Carnew by a single point. Our juvenile team kept the flag flying when they won the small schools league final. Our Junior B Football team under the guidance of Matt Finn were making great exploits and progress in the new West Competition for the winter and spring called the Crawl Cup. They had won three out of three matches and looked a good bunch of young players for the future. While the Intermediate Hurling Championship was been replayed in the Co Boardroom with objections and counter objections over the legalities of both teams which was eventually decided, a replay refixed for Baltinglass in early December. Avoca sent a telegram to the secretary John Timmins stating that they would not be travelling for the fixture. The County Chairman was at the venue to present the cup to Kiltegan but the team refused to accept the trophy. So the Intermediate Hurling Championship was ruled null & void for 1974. Treasurer the late Larry Daly said we reached new heights in fund raising, income was £3,885.361/2p, Expenses were £3,693.471/2p, Balance £191.881/2p.

Tom Pearson was top scorer in football with 8 goals -38 points. Nat Pearson (RIP) was top scorer in hurling 2 goals 21 points. Peter Keogh and Michael Farrell were the busiest players playing 31 games out of a total of 45 matches that year.
